- <u>Literary Forms Communications 10 (Special Education)</u>: This course serves to strengthen the student's understanding and use of language, both written and verbal communication. Readings include the novel, drama, poetry, and short story from both classical and contemporary literature. Verbal and visual teaching, such as poetry recitation and analysis of fine art, inspires student learning.
- Honors Literary Concepts 10: This course provides the student with an in-depth and
  accelerated study of literature. Students expand their appreciation for the basic literary
  forms as they become more sophisticated in approaches to their reading and writing.
